The roads around Mosley Common are already heavily congested and the new houses currently being built will only add to this, let alone additional houses that are proposed to be built. Additional building of houses will overload an already saturated road infrastructure system and will destroy a valuable wildlife-rich site.
	The laws of supply and demand for housing are not always as simple as proposed and previous household projections in the North West, such as the Government Office for the North West, Regional Planning Guidance for the North West (RPG13) TSO, 2003, have highlighted this. The oversupply of new housing has meant house prices have actually dropped and has also triggered a spiral of neglect and abandonment of homes as housing markets do not behave as they should. Falling house prices does not stimulate demand but can in fact curtail it.
	The carbon footprint of building a new two-bedroomed house has been calculated at 80 tonnes (over eight times a UK citizens" current average annual footprint, which has to be reduced by 80 per cent by 2050) and building a new home is only the tip of the iceberg. There needs to be street lighting, sewers, gas, electric and communication networks built etc.
