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
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## ***i. Summary***

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In February 2019, GMAAS and the Centre for Applied Archaeology was commissioned by the Greater Manchester Combined Authority to undertake a screening exercise of the historic environment interest on the Sites allocated within the Greater Manchester Spatial Framework. This work is in the form of an assessment to understand the nature of the archaeology, built heritage, historic landscape, and setting for each land allocation. Each Site is placed within one of six categories, according to the nature of the heritage assets contained within and located further afield. These are colour coded according to whether sites have been screened in with archaeological and designated heritage asset considerations as well (red, categories 1 and 2), screened in but with archaeological or designated heritage asset considerations only (amber, categories 3-5) or screened out (green, category 6).

The Northern Gateway Land Allocation (centred at NGR 383479, 407399) covers a total area of approximately 881ha, lies broadly near the M60/M62/M66 junction at Simister Island and across two separate local authorities: Bury and Rochdale. It is split into three separate allocations.

It is suggested that Site Allocation GMA1: Northern Gateway is screened in and has been placed within Red, Category 1. The Site contains designated heritage assets and there are also designated heritage assets further afield where an impact on setting and/or visual impact is a concern. There is potential for archaeological remains from all periods, however it is unlikely that Roman or Early Medieval finds will be encountered. It should be also noted that the Church of St George has a cremation ground and any direct impact should be avoided.

A number of recommendations have been made and the accompanying Summary Report provides further information regarding the next steps.

## ***ii. Introduction***

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In preparing the revised Greater Manchester Spatial Framework (GMSF) land allocations, the Greater Manchester Combined Authority (GMCA) commissioned GMAAS (Greater Manchester Archaeological Advisory Service), with the Centre for Applied Archaeology at the University of Salford to provide a screening exercise of the historic environment interest. This work is in the form of an assessment to understand the nature of the archaeology, built heritage, historic landscape, and setting for each land allocation. It provides specific recommendations for more detailed assessment to help meet the requirements of NPPF.

The National Planning Policy Framework (published 2018, revised February 2019) stipulates that:

- The allocations have been informed by a proper assessment of the significance of designated and non-designated heritage assets in the area, including their settings where appropriate (NPPF paragraphs 184, 185, 189, 190 and 194);
- There has been a proper assessment to identify new sites of archaeological or historic interest (NPPF paragraph 187);
- There has been a proper assessment to identify land where development would be inappropriate because of its archaeological and/or historic significance (NPPF paragraphs 190, 193-197)

In 2018, a pilot exercise was undertaken for the Salford City Council area. This comprised separate archaeological and designated heritage asset (including local listings) analyses which were then combined to form the final, published reports on 4 Spatial Framework allocations. The methodology adopted for the remaining 47 allocation sites across the other 9 districts of Greater Manchester is based on the Salford study. However, the following screening exercise is a more rapid assessment of the historic environment, therefore is less detailed than the Salford assessments but does combine designated, and non-designated heritage asset considerations.

The report on Northern Gateway is a standalone assessment due to the size of the Site.

### ***iii. Methodology Statement***

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#### *iii.i Introduction*

A screening exercise was applied to the Northern Gateway land allocations (referred to as 'Sites'). This aimed to identify which of the Sites may impact directly, affect the setting or have a visual impact, on designated and non-designated heritage assets.

The site allocations were subject to further assessment and comprised:

- A review and enhancement of the Greater Manchester Historic Environment Record (HER) to identify and map non-designated and designated heritage assets (this also included any other relevant databases, such as the National Heritage List);
- An historic map regression exercise to identify previously unrecognised heritage assets with archaeological and/or built heritage interest;
- A review of the findings of previous archaeological investigations carried out on or near the sites, along with any relevant published or secondary sources. This includes grey literature, local publications, thematic surveys and also incorporated the North West Regional Research Framework for the Historic Environment (NWRRF);
- Analysis of available historic and current aerial photography and LiDAR data;
- Collation of all non-designated and designated heritage assets, as identified by the above research within each Site, into a Gazetteer accompanied by a map showing their positions. A buffer zone of 250m was applied to each land allocation to identify heritage assets 'further afield' (i.e. not within the land allocation);
- site visits and walkover surveys to identify any further potential heritage assets, and assess the potential for the survival of below-ground archaeological remains as identified from the desk-based research. The Sites were visited over a period of 3 months between March and June 2019 and were limited to publicly accessible land and footpaths. Designated heritage assets which were visible from the Site and located further afield (beyond 250m), were also flagged up in the assessments.

The above was applied to the land allocation and a 250m buffer zone. The accompanying archaeological and historical background is informed by the following period allocations:

### *iii.ii Screening Categories*

Following an assessment of the available sources as detailed above, the Sites were screened in or out, according to a ‘traffic light’ system and are listed below in descending order of priority for further work on assessing the significance of the heritage assets identified:

- **Red:** Sites recommended for screening in. This has been split into two different categories.
  - **Category 1** The Sites that both have concerns over the impact on designated heritage assets within the boundary and also non-designated heritage assets which have the potential to be of high significance. These should be dealt with pre-planning and treated as the highest priority.
  - **Category 2** The second category outline the Sites that have concerns over the impact on designated heritage assets within the boundary, however the non-designated heritage assets can be dealt with through the planning process.
- **Amber:** Site is recommended for screening in. Designated heritage assets identified further afield may be impacted upon visually or through their setting and/or non-designated heritage assets may be impacted on directly. It is suggested that much of this work can be carried out as part of the planning process, or with further assessment be screened out altogether. This has been split into three categories:
  - **Category 3** Sites where the development could affect the setting of, or have a visual impact on, designated heritage assets and there is the potential for a direct impact upon non-designated heritage assets. 18 sites have been identified within this category
  - **Category 4** Sites where the development could affect the setting of, or have a visual impact on, designated heritage assets. 5 sites have been identified within this category
  - **Category 5** Sites where only non-designated heritage assets are likely to be impacted. 7 sites have been identified within this category

- **Green: Category 6** (Chapter 8) Sites recommended for screening out. Sites where there is thought to be no impact on designated heritage assets and with no or very low archaeological potential.

### *iii.iii Structure of the Report*

This document is concerned with providing an understanding of the historic environment, which is defined as consisting of the archaeology, built heritage, historic landscape, and setting of the individual land allocations within the GMSF.

A report has been produced for each district, as well as for each cross-boundary land allocation. Each report contains a separate chapter on the land allocations identified according to their district, within the GMSF. Although the cross-boundary land allocations have been allocated their own report, they are referred to within the individual district sections, if they fall within the relevant area.

At the start of each chapter, a statement (in italics) summarises the reasons for screening out or in. Each land allocation has a section on the site location, topography and land use, including information on the geology as well. This can be useful in locating favourable areas for past settlement, in the absence of data on the historic environment. The historical background sets out the relevant historical, as well as archaeological information derived from previous work done within or adjacent to the land allocation. This is enhanced by historic map regression as well as the relevant HER data. Based on this information, the potential for the survival of archaeological remains is then assessed. An outline of previous archaeological work that has taken place within, or near the Site, is also provided, as well as any relevant planning applications.

A gazetteer details the designated and non-designated heritage assets that have been identified through the assessment. Each gazetteer entry (abbreviated to **HA**) has a summary description and a map is provided for each land allocation showing the location of heritage assets. A historic map extract is also provided, taken from the first edition Ordnance Survey, published between 1848 and 1882.

The conclusion summarises the outcome of the screening exercise and whether the Site is screened in for a more detailed heritage impact assessment. It outlines whether there are designated and non-designated heritage assets and whether they may be impacted directly, have their setting affected or be impacted upon visually, and outlines the possible work which may be required in order to satisfy the requirements of NPPF. In the case of designated heritage assets, the need for further assessment, which could include significance statements and setting assessments is flagged up. For non-designated heritage assets, further archaeological mitigation is outlined, although this is Site dependent; some assets may require more detailed desk-based studies and there may be a need to consider a landscape as a whole, even if no heritage assets have been identified. Further investigation, in the form of non-intrusive (e.g. fieldwalking, walkover surveys and geophysics) and intrusive (e.g. evaluation and excavation) methods, is outlined. For those sites that are screened in, the more

detailed assessment will determine at which point in the planning process identified archaeological sites can be dealt with.

There is also an accompanying Summary Report, which outlines the key conclusions from the screening exercise as well as recommendations for further work.

# **GMA1 Northern Gateway (BU/RO) – Screened In**

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*It is recommended that this Site is screened in; there are a number of designated sites within, and outside, the land allocations which will require further assessment. There is a high potential for archaeological remains ranging from the prehistoric to Industrial periods, and a number of buildings dating from the 17<sup>th</sup> century onwards still stand, therefore further archaeological work is recommended.*

## **1.1 Site Location, Topography and Land Use**

The Northern Gateway Land Allocation (centred at NGR 383479, 407399) covers a total area of approximately 881ha, lies broadly near the M60/M62/M66 junction at Simister Island and across two separate local authorities: Bury and Rochdale. It is split into three separate allocations:

- GMA1.1 (640ha) is bounded by the M66 to the west, Brightley Brook and Pilsworth Road to the north, Heywood to the east and the M62 to the south
- GMA1.2 (218ha and 23ha) is bounded by the M60 and M62 to the south, west and north and Heywood Old Road (A6045) and Mere Brook to the east. There is an additional area to the south-east bounded by the A6045 to the west, Rhodes to the south and Boardman Lane/Elks Lane to the east and north.
- GMA1.3 (63ha) is bounded by the M66 to the east, M62 to the south and Unsworth to the west and north.

The topography of the area is fairly undulating and at a height of approximately 100m above Ordnance Datum. There are localised areas of higher ground, of which some are sand and gravel 'islands' sitting above the lower levels of peat. Most of the area is rural with isolated farm complexes, although there is Birch Industrial Park within GMA1.1.

The geology is dominated by the lower and middle coal measures, however there is a small band of sandstone (Woodhead Hill Rock) at the northern edge of GMA1.1, which has been quarried in the past. There are small areas of sandstone (Chester Formation) and mudstone (Manchester Marls Formation) within GMA1.3. There is a mix of superficial geologies with till over much of the area north of the M62 (GMA1.1; 1.3) and hummocky glacial deposits to the south (GMA1.2). There are also localised areas of sands and gravels, reflected in former sand pits across the landscape, and peat as well (British Geological Survey 2017). The largest of these are Unsworth Moss, which lies within the south-western part of GMA1.1 and Siddal Moor which lies within the eastern part of GMA1.1. There are also smaller areas within the land allocation as well.



## 1.2 Historical Background

### 1.2.1 Overview

There is little evidence for prehistoric settlement within the Site, although the underlying geology indicates there are favourable areas for settlement. Areas of sands and gravels have been recorded across the Site, which would be favourable for prehistoric activity, especially if they are close to watercourses. Two areas of peat have also been identified at Unsworth Moss (**HA11**) and Siddal Moor (**HA12**) and previous survey work suggests that there is potential for the preservation of organic remains (Hall *et al* 1995, 150-153). A number of cropmarks have also been identified within the land allocations that have the potential to be prehistoric in origin (e.g. **HA15**). In addition, there are isolated finds recorded from the area as well although these are relatively few in number.

There are no recorded Roman finds or sites within the land allocation; the nearest Roman road is c.2.5km to the west and broadly follows the A56 through Prestwich and northwards to Ribchester.

Archaeology of the early Medieval period is poorly recorded across the Greater Manchester area in general and there are no recorded finds within the Site. Into the later Medieval period, the Site remained predominantly rural and covers a number of townships, including Unsworth, Little Heaton and Great Heaton. Previous excavations have shown that nearby Post-Medieval farm complexes have Medieval origins (e.g. Lomax's and Captain's Farms) and may be the case for a number of the complexes across the Site. Work at Meadow Croft Fold (**HA7**), which is first recorded in 1202, has shown that this was probably a larger settlement which shrunk and disappeared during the 19<sup>th</sup> century. Evidence for smelting has been recorded at both Meadow Croft and near Whittle Fold (**HA8**) and there have been isolated finds from this period. Large swathes of ridge and furrow, some of which may be Medieval in origin, has been identified from aerial photography and LiDAR data.

During the Post-Medieval period, it is likely that large areas of land were enclosed in a piecemeal fashion, with parliamentary enclosure towards the end of the period. A number of farm complexes are first recorded during this period, and the earliest surviving structure is Brick Farmhouse (**HA1**) which dates to 1681. Most of the surviving buildings associated with these farmsteads are heavily modified and few are pre-19<sup>th</sup> century in date. Although difficult to date, there are a number of possible coal pits scattered across the northern part of the Site (GMA1.1) and could indicate early coal mining activity. There is a documentary reference to a *Coleyfyld* in 1587 which attests to the early presence of coal mining activity (Orion Heritage 2016, 11). During the 17<sup>th</sup> century, small communities at 'folds' were allowed to carry out mining and many communities dug for the coal seams that lay close to the surface (LP Archaeology 2017). A number of probable marl pits, used for increasing the productivity of the soils, are also present across the Site but these are often indistinguishable with other small-scale industrial activity such as sand extraction and coal pits.

In the 19<sup>th</sup> century, a number of the smaller farmsteads disappear, as does the settlement at Meadow Croft Fold. Industrial activity is fairly limited across the Site, there is no evidence for active coal mining on the OS mapping. There is however evidence for some small-scale sandstone quarrying as well as sand and gravel pits. A fustian mill (later bleach works) and a woollen mill (**HA42**) were established along Brightley Brook along the northern edge of the land allocation.

With the exception of Simister, there is very little development within the land allocations until the motorways were constructed in the late 20<sup>th</sup> century. There is also Birch Industrial Park which was developed during the later 20<sup>th</sup> century as well. There is evidence for quarrying, though Pilsworth Quarry is outside the land allocation. There is also a former landfill site on the north-eastern side of GMA1.1 for which there is no archaeological interest.

### 1.2.2 *Archaeological Potential*

The assessment has shown that there is high potential for archaeology from all periods, though it is unlikely that remains relating to the Roman or Early Medieval periods will be encountered.

Meadowcroft Fold deserted medieval settlement is of particular interest as the site has potential for several poorly understood aspects of archaeology, as identified in the North West Archaeological Research Framework (2006): a potentially rich sequence of palaeo-environmental deposits, the typology and character of medieval pottery from rural sites, the nature of medieval iron smelting sites and technology, and the origins of medieval and early post-medieval rural settlement.

### 1.2.4 Previous Archaeological Work

There have been several pieces of archaeological work carried out within, partly covering, or just outside the land allocations. Most of these are high level desk-based assessments however there has been very little intrusive work in the area. One of the largest pieces of work was a series of DBAs for the proposed M60 which assessed a large part of the current land allocations (GMAU 1990; 1993).

Unsworth Moss (**HA11**) and Siddal Moor (**HA12**) were assessed during the Greater Manchester Wetlands Survey during the early 1990s (Hall *et al* 1995). There have been smaller scale pieces of work within the Site, including at Meadow Croft Fold which has confirmed its Medieval origins. Organic remains including worked timbers and medieval leather shoes have been excavated by Bury Archaeology Group while a limited field walking exercise found large quantities of medieval pottery and iron smelting waste. This led to a partnership project being proposed and a grant sought from the Aggregates Levy Sustainability Fund. Whilst the grant application was unsuccessful, it did allow for a detailed brief to be prepared for archaeological investigation of this site of potentially high significance (Redhead 2006). A watching brief took place at Pike Fold Golf Club in 1996-97 which also involved recording the 18<sup>th</sup> century farmhouse at Back o'th' Moss. A further watching brief took place in 2000 however neither of these revealed any below ground archaeological remains. A geophysical survey was carried out east of Pike Fold Golf Course in 2004 in advance

of a proposed extension and revealed features of interest but it could not be determined if they were archaeological.

Outside of the land allocation area, previous DBAs have identified the potential for areas of prehistoric activity (e.g. Spout Bank Quarry in 1996). Excavation and building survey work during the late 1990s and early 2000s have taken place at the Post-Medieval farm complexes at Hill Top, Captain's and Lomax Farms.

A DBA was carried out on Heaton Park in 2008, which lies to the south-west of the land allocation. There was one on Siddal Moor College in 2009 and a further DBA around South Heywood was carried out in 2016, followed by historic building assessment, landscape survey and cartographic and photographic analysis, reported in 2017. Further work is anticipated leading on from this (see Conclusion). A building survey was also carried out at the former Wesleyan Chapel in Rhodes in 2006.

### 1.3 Gazetteer

The Gazetteer primarily references sites that are within, or immediately adjacent, to the land allocation boundary and are listed with designated heritage assets first, then non-designated heritage assets. A table at the end of the gazetteer outlines additional non-designated heritage assets from the HER which are either outside the land allocation or are of negligible importance (such as former extraction pits, or ponds).

## *1.4 Site Visit*

The Site Visit was conducted in one day on the 28<sup>th</sup> March 2019. A general walkover was done using public footpaths across all of the land allocations. The listed buildings were visited, with the exception of Lower Whittle as it was not publicly accessible, as well as Meadowcroft Fold.

Most of GMA1.1 consists of gently undulating pasture and although there are lines of trees. There are uninterrupted and long reaching views to the south, towards Manchester from some areas. Over towards Meadowcroft Fold, there are long reaching views over towards the Moors to the north.

GMA1.2 consists of undulating pasture as well, although there are a number of localised areas where the topography drops steeply. Generally, the topography rises from south to north. Within the north-western part of the Site is the village of Simister which generally straddles either side of Simister Lane.

GMA1.3 was not visited on this occasion.

### *Lower Whittle Farmhouse (Grade II Listed)*

Unfortunately, access was not possible however the building is surrounded by a number of later buildings, particularly to the north. A number of trees lie to the south which screens the building from this direction.

*Church of St George (Grade II Listed)*



***Plate 1.4.1: Church of St George at the southern end of Simister***

The Church of St George is a low rise building and does not sit much higher than nearby residential units. It forms part of the southern extent of the settlement at Simister and is screened by a line of trees along its southern edge.

*Brick Farmhouse (Grade II Listed)*

Brick Farmhouse lies in a relatively flat location topographically, however it is screened by trees to the east and south and has later buildings attached to the west. There is also a small development ongoing to the south of the farm as well.

*Birch Village Conservation Area*

The Site Visit confirmed that there is no visible connection with the area to the north as the M62 motorway sits higher up. It is not anticipated that any further assessment of significance would be required as there appears to be no setting issues.

## Meadowcroft Fold



***Plate 1.4.3: The abandoned farmstead and barn at Meadowcroft Fold; the standing buildings are probably early 19th century in date***

The Site Visit confirmed that the buildings shown on recent mapping are still standing, and are mainly used for storage purposes. Previous survey work has identified earthworks and features potentially associated with the Medieval settlement however only one of these fields was publicly accessible. Localised changes in the topography were noted but no definitive features could be positively identified. However metalworking debris, potentially from medieval iron smelting, was identified within several molehills along the public footpath.

## 1.5 Conclusion

It is suggested that Site Allocation GMA1: Northern Gateway is screened in and has been placed within Red, Category 1. The Site contains designated heritage assets (Brick House – GMA1.1, Lower Whittle Farmhouse – GMA1.1 and the Church of St. George – GMA1.3). There are also designated heritage assets further afield, including Heaton Park and the designated heritage assets contained within. There is potential for archaeological remains from all periods, however it is unlikely that Roman or Early Medieval finds will be encountered. It should be also noted that the Church of St George (**HA94**) has a cremation ground and any direct impact should be avoided.

Further work is outlined below, however due to the size of the site, the number of heritage assets and potential identified and the variety of work put forward, a more detailed scheme of work is recommended. Any further work should include further assessment of the designated heritage assets identified within the Site but also further afield. Meadow Croft Fold (**HA6**) has the potential to be of high significance and further work is recommended to fully understand the extent, nature and potential of the archaeological remains here, to be assessed using Annex 1 Scheduling criteria (DCMS 2013). It should be noted that the eastern part of the GM1.1 allocation, falling within Rochdale MBC, has already come forward as a large-scale development proposal called “South Heywood”. Archaeological assessment work is well advanced for this proposal site and a scheme of archaeological trial trenching has been

approved. Further work could also help answer a number of research questions identified within the updated NWRRF.

For the rest of the GM1 land allocations a series of historic building assessments, walkover surveys, geophysics and intrusive work is recommended:

- Further assessment of the designated heritage assets identified within and outside the land allocations including setting
- An archaeological assessment of Meadowcroft Fold (**HA7**) deserted medieval settlement and iron smelting site against Annex 1 Scheduling criteria, based on the proposed archaeological survey project set out in 2006. This proposal could be used for the basis of any future archaeological work
- A programme of historic building assessments for the Post-Medieval/19<sup>th</sup> century farmsteads which still survive across the land allocations
- Further non-intrusive work involving walkover surveys and geophysics, targeting the potential prehistoric sites such as the smaller mounds and the sand and gravel 'islands' as well as potential early coal mining sites
- The surviving areas of peat should also be assessed for their potential for palaeoenvironmental evidence survival
- Other sites such as the smelting site at Whittle Brook (**HA8**) (Medieval Agenda Q43) and the possible moated farmstead (**HA9**) should also be targeted for detailed archaeological assessment.
- A programme of intrusive work is recommended following on from the above initial work, plus for sites such as the cropmarks and earthworks which are currently undated (e.g. **HA14**; **HA99**; **HA132**) and the undeveloped Post-Medieval farmsteads (e.g. **HA38**; **HA126**; **HA128**), especially Mizzey and Moss (**HA103**) which has previously produced evidence for activity dating to this period
- An assessment of any potential historic hedgerows

This work has the potential to answer a number of questions from the updated regional research framework, particularly relating to the Prehistoric, Medieval and Post-Medieval period




